What is a village?

A village is a group of houses and associated buildings, larger than a hamlet and smaller than a town, situated in a rural area.

Nucleated—around a central point (church, market place)

Linear—along a line, perhaps a physical feature

What are the human features round Kings Stanley? What street furniture is in KS?

Human features are: houses, roads, bridges, factories
