<b>'Shosholoza' a cappella</b> To sing a traditional African song unaccompanied	Hold the tune of my part within a group performance Sing unaccompanied Use expression within my singing
Playing 'Shosholoza' To use tuned percussion to play a chord progression	Play a major chord on tuned percussion Play a two-chord progression Play the progression with accuracy
The 'Shosholoza' show To use vocals or tuned percussion to perform a piece of music as an ensemble	Maintain and play my part accurately Stay in time with the other performers Offer suggestions for improvement
Drumming away to Africa To play call and response rhythms using percussion instruments	Listen to the pulse and play my instrument in time Join back in if I lose my place Count the rests (silences) accurately
<b>Eight-beat breaks</b> To create an eight beat break to play within a performance	Create a break that fills eight counts Play my break accurately Play my break in the correct place and in time


### **Musical Knowledge**

To know that songs sung in other languages can contain sounds that are unfamiliar to us, like the clicks of the Xhosa language.

To know that 'The Click Song' is a traditional song sung in the Xhosa language and is believed to bring good luck at weddings.

To understand that major chords create a bright, happy sound.

To know that poly-rhythms means many rhythms played at once.
