The Prevent Duty

PREVENT is a vital initiative aimed at countering radicalization and underscores the crucial role parents play in safeguarding their children from extremist influences. As guardians, it is essential for parents to actively engage with their children, fostering open communication and creating an environment where thoughts and concerns can be freely shared.

By staying informed about their child's online activities, social circles and overall well-being, parents can identify early signs of vulnerability to radicalization. Encouraging critical thinking, tolerance and respect for diverse perspectives can fortify young minds against extremist ideologies. Additionally, fostering a sense of belonging within the family and community provides a powerful counterbalance to the appeal of radical groups.

In the collective effort to prevent radicalization, parents serve as the first line of defence, shaping resilient individuals capable of navigating the complexities of the modern world.

All staff at KSPS are fully trained in the PREVENT strategy.

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Medication Changes

The entire staff had their first aid refresher training on Monday 8th January and as a result we need to implement some changes.

Updates to the training mean that we are no longer able to diagnose or treat the children without formal consent from parents or carers. This means is we can no longer provide any medicine such as calpol or anthisan by requesting permission over the phone.

If your child is suffering with a cold, headache or other minor ailment that you think will require calpol, please bring the required medicine to the office where you will be asked to complete a medication form.

This is already our practice for antibiotics but we have been advised it needs to be a blanket approach for all medication.
